



## Expectations Cont.

Student organizations must maintain an updated constitution and by-laws for the organization and report changes to the organization's campus governing body.

Student organizations must be not-for-profit or for personal gain of any individual.

Student organizations must avoid hazing activities as defined by the University Hazing Policy.

If a student organization is affiliated with an external organization, the campus chapter must submit a copy of the constitution, articles of incorporation or other governance document of the external organization for university approval. In all cases, University policies and regulations supersede those of the external organization.

## Civility Statement

Prominent among the values that define the Johns Hopkins University community is civility, which includes mutual respect, fairness, and politeness. Membership in any community requires a concern for the common good for all who belong to that community. Each individual may possess different ideas, as well as different ways of communicating those ideas, particularly in a community as varied and diverse as an association. Because of these differences, respect and civility are integral to maintaining the quality of the association environment. Respect and civility should therefore be afforded to all individual regardless of role within the association. This includes treating people with courtesy and consideration, acting and speaking judiciously and behaving professionally.

All members of the campus community are called upon to promote and value this ethic of common respect and civility. We will encourage discussion with a goal of instilling an appreciation for the importance of fair-mindedness, personal responsibility, and respect for differing opinions. At such occasions, members will always be strongly encouraged to observe common standards of decorum and to display a respectful tenor. We will also consider appropriate steps to be taken when members of our community do not respect these standards.

## Privileges of Student Organizations

**Registered student organizations (RSO) are entitled to:**

1. Be listed as a recognized organization in all university publications and related websites
2. Use the Johns Hopkins University name, logo, and seal per university guidelines
3. Request room reservations through the scheduling office
4. Host events on campus and sponsor programs and activities
5. Conduct fundraising activities on campus
6. Publicize events on campus; including the usage of Today's Announcements and [events.jhu.edu](http://events.jhu.edu)
7. Establish on-campus bank accounts and apply for university funding (note that some organization categories are not eligible for university funding)
8. Reserve a table at the annual Student Activities Fair (note that space is limited)
9. Receive a mailbox on campus (note that space is limited)
10. Utilize university resources to recruit new members
