

- g. Privacy: Guests may not sleep in an unoccupied bed without the prior written consent of the student whose bed is to be used.
- h. Restricted Days: Overnight guests are not permitted during orientation week, final examination weeks, or vacation periods.

## 9. Harassment

- a. Bias-Related: Bias-related incidents are hostile acts against persons, property, or an institution that involve a victim(s) selected on the basis of their actual or perceived race, color, religion, age, gender, ethnic/regional/national origin group, nationality, disability status, sex or sexual orientation.
- b. General: Any willful, intentional, and/or persistent act that annoys, degrades or embarrasses another individual may be considered harassment. Any intentional and/or persistent telephone calls, cellular phone calls, text messages, IM sessions, or other electronic communications that are designed to or have the effect of annoying any member of the University community
- c. Threatening: The verbal or written threat of any harmful physical act upon another.

## 10. Hazing (Resources/Procedure pg 20)

- a. Assisting: Asking for, or providing assistance to any other person or organization to haze.
- b. General: Acts (planned or executed) that include but are not limited to: requesting a potential organizational or social member to drink alcohol, use of blindfolds, participation in scavenger hunts, requiring participation in activities that disrupt a student's normal course of business at the University (food, rest, shelter, study, social interaction, exercise, etc), humiliation of others, performing public displays of silliness or actions that could be perceived as demeaning are considered hazing. Attempts to mask hazing by "asking their permission" or the equivalent are also prohibited.
- c. Witnessing: Observing acts of hazing without immediately reporting hazing activity to a University official is prohibited.

## 11. Law and Statutes (Resources/Procedure pg. 21)

- a. General: Any violation of city, state, federal or international law is prohibited and will be adjudicated through the Office of Community Standards and Civility in addition to any action taken by civil authorities.

## 12. Misrepresentation

- a. False Testimony: Lying, misrepresentation of facts or giving false testimony to any University official
- b. Forgery: Forging, transferring, altering, wrongfully obtaining or otherwise misusing documents including (but not limited to): checks, transcripts, drivers' licenses, Campus One Card, computer files, electronic mail, and online identities.
- c. Records: Falsification of any University record(s) or use of any computer to gain unauthorized access to, and/or abuse of any existing official University record.

## 13. Safety and Security

- a. Dangerous Objects: The possession and/or use of any dangerous object, weapon, or any object that could endanger a member of the University community. The University police and administrative staff have the final determination as to any item or items that will/can be considered a dangerous object. Objects that have been pre-determined as dangerous include, but are not limited to: explosive devices, guns, replicas, hazardous material, fireworks, firearms, BB guns, knives, sling shots and pepper spray.
- b. Security Systems: Any attempt to compromise University security systems is strictly prohibited.
- c. Theft: The theft of personal property or University property. This includes misuse of student activity funds and/or University funds in general.
- d. Unauthorized Area: Students are not permitted on the roof top of any building (including houses in the University Area), in electrical rooms, mechanical rooms, or in/on any area of campus where access is prohibited.

## 14. Physical Abuse (Resources/Procedure pg 21)

- a. Fighting: Any physically abusive confrontation of any person by a student or between students at any time is strictly prohibited.
- b. Harmful Action: Any physical action that brings harm to self or to others. This includes (but is not limited to): cutting, slapping, throwing objects, etc. Students demonstrating self-harm will be referred to the Director of Counseling and Health Services in lieu of adjudication. Failure to comply with the referral will result in further action in the Student Conduct System.

## 15. Sexual Misconduct (Resources/Procedure pg 24)

- a. Exploitation: Sexual Exploitation is taking non-consensual, unjust or abusive sexual advantage of another for the exploiter's personal advantage/benefit, or for the benefit/advantage of anyone other than the person being exploited.
- b. Harassment: Conduct of a sexual nature which is unwanted, causes discomfort or embarrassment, and/or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive environment.
